




Longbridge Deverill

A stroll round our lovely village. Allow 1½ hours. A couple of busy road crossings, plus a flight of steps and one stile.



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1 From the car park entrance, turn left and left again (signposted Maiden Bradley). 2 Follow the road past Church Farm (right) and Homefields (left) and out of the village. 3 After 250m, turn right onto a track signposted 'Restricted Byway Shute Farm A350'. 4 Climb the hill and continue to a junction by another signposted byway to the right. 5 Carry straight on, signposted as a Permissive Restrictive Byway to Shute Farm and A350/Fox Holes. 6 When you reach another track at a T-junction, turn right through a gate (signposted 'A350'). 7 This hedged byway winds pleasantly down to the main road. When you reach the A350, turn left along the pavement. 8 Just after the end of the central reservation, but before the Crockerton sign, cross with care to a footpath sign on the opposite side of the road. 9 Walk down the obliquely laid concrete steps and climb a stile into a field 10 Turn right and walk down the field towards the church. 11 Go through a gap in the wall and then a kissing gate into the churchyard. 12 Walk to the left of the church building and exit via a gate into the lane beyond.

13 Walk past the village hall to the main road. 14 For a shortcut you can continue along the main road to the George, but to continue the walk, turn left in front of Sir James Thynne House (an almshouse founded in 1665 by Sir James Thynne of Longleat House). 15 Cross the River Wylye via a footbridge and turn right over a further footbridge. 16 Bear right to a gate into a field and cross diagonally to a kissing gate. 17 Follow the lane beyond, uphill. 18 At the top of the hill, turn right past a metal gate onto a footpath with views to Longbridge Deverill House, now an old people's home. 19 Follow the narrow path downhill to emerge between houses into Sand Street. 20 Again, for a shortcut you can turn right here and cross the Wylye to return to the George. But to continue the walk, follow the footpath opposite between gardens. 21 Exit via a kissing gate into fields and continue along the left-hand side of a field. 22 Go through another kissing gate at the far end and pass to the left of a thatched cottage.

23 Turn right to a junction by another thatched cottage. 24 Turn right and follow the lane back to the A350. 25 Turn right onto a path and cross the Wylye via a footbridge. 26 Follow the path parallel to the main road back to the George.

What to Bring for Your Walk?

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


Brixton Deverill

Visit our neighbouring village and its historic church.

Allow 2 hours. A couple of moderate climbs; field paths may be muddy.

Several stiles.



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From the front of the pub, cross the A350 into Sand Street. 2 Walk down the road and cross the River Wylye. 3 By a thatched cottage on the left, turn right onto a narrow public footpath between gardens. 4 Exit via a kissing gate into fields and continue along the left-hand side of a field. 5 Go through another kissing gate at the far end and pass to the left of a thatched cottage. 6 Turn right to a junction by another thatched cottage. 7 Turn left past Sturgess Farmhouse and Manor Farm and follow the lane to the main road. 8 Cross with care and cross the stile opposite into a field. 9 Cross to another stile.10 Walk round the left-hand side of the field, with views of Hill Deverill Manor. 11 Descend to a path crossing and turn left, crossing a field towards some barns. 12 Turn right in front of the first barn and follow the track as it winds uphill. 13 When the path levels off and then swings left, carry on straight ahead across a field. 14 Descend to a double-stile in the hedge. 15 Cross the next field, descending towards the village of Brixton Deverill.

16 Go through a gateway onto a farm track and bear right past a thatched cottage to the manor house and church. 17 Follow the road right, past another thatched cottage to the B3095. 18 Turn right over the River Wylye. 19 By another thatched house (Riversdale Cottage), turn left. An "important and well-preserved" Roman villa with a high-quality mosaic was discovered in a paddock to your left during cable-laying in 2015. 20 Walk between two houses then, before the buildings of Woodcombe Farm, turn right onto a bridleway. 21 Follow the hedged track as it climbs a shoulder of the hill. 22 When the lane swings left at the end of a wood, take the bridleway on the right through a gate into the trees. 23 Follow a path down the side of the wood and then between hedges. 24 At a crossroads of tracks turn right, along a signposted Restricted Byway. 25 After a memorial bench on the right, the track climbs a low hill to a double gateway. 26 Between the two gates, leave the track for a public footpath that leads down the left-hand side of the field to your left.

27 Climb a stile into the road. 28 Turn left and follow the road past the watercress beds on the right back into Longbridge Deverill village. 29 Beyond Mill Close, go through a gate on your left and cross the village green to a bridge over the stream back to the George Inn car park.

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


Shear Water

A varied walk to a woodland lake.

Allow 3 hours. Moderate climbs, and some paths and tracks may be muddy.





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1 From the front of the pub, cross the A350 into Sand Street. 2 Walk down the road and cross the River Wylye. 3 By a thatched cottage on the left, turn left into a driveway and beyond a house on the left follow a narrow public footpath uphill. 4 When you meet a narrow lane, turn left and follow it downhill to a kissing gate. 5 Cross a field to another gate, then cross two footbridges over the River Wylye. 6 Walk up to the main road by Sir James Thynne House, then turn right along the lane past the village hall to the church. 7 Walk to the right of the church building to find a public footpath that leads through a kissing gate into a field. 8 Go through a gap in a stone wall and walk up the field below the A350. 9 Climb a stile in the left-hand fence and then a flight of oblique concrete steps to the main road. 10 Walk about 50m left then, just before the central reservation begins, cross the road with care. 11 Turn right along the pavement on the other side and, just before a 50mph sign, follow the path left, away from the road. 12 This path joins a road that runs past a couple of houses to a junction on a bend. 13 Turn left, away from the main road, and follow the road round to the right. 14 Beyond Easter Cottage (left) and Foxholes House (right) turn left into a Restricted Byway signposted to 'Shearwater'. 15 Follow the path beyond a waymark post uphill along the edge of the wood, with a dry valley to your left. 16 Follow the path round to the right at the end of the wood and then through trees until you meet another track. 17 Turn left past another waymark post. 18 Keep to the main track (right) at a fork and then cross another path, following the signposted Permissive Bridleway. 19 Follow the prakes it bears left and descends to the car park by the Shear Water dam. 20 Follow the permissive path opposite the car park along the adm (as of spring 2025 the dam was closed for maintenance; if this closure is still in place, follow the signposted diversion to the east – see map).

At the far side of the dam, pass the sailing club hut and turn left. 22 Ignoring a track off to the right, stay on the lakeside route. 23 Pass the small lakeside building and continue to the end of the lake. 24 Continue along the lake beyond the barrier. 25 At a junction marked by a rock reading 'Nockatt car park', turn left. 26 Follow the undulating, winding track for a little over half a mile with the brackeny valley of Swancombe Bottom to your left. 27 When you meet another track at a hairpin bend (with a waymark post on the right), turn sharp left. 28 The track continues along the other side of Swancombe Bottom. 29 The track bends left on the approach to Swancombe Cottage; turn right along an unsurfaced path parallel to the road. 30 Pass a hunting tower and follow the path downhill to the left and past a barrier to the road. 31 Turn right then immediately left onto the ascending driveway to Shute Farm (signposted Restricted Byway). 32 Follow the drive around a bend and past the farm buildings onto a farm track. 33 Follow this track through a series of fields to a gate, beyond which it narrows to a path. 34 When you meet a crossing path, turn right (signposted Longbridge Deverill) then immediately left and right again to resume travelling in the same direction as before, now along a rutted farm track lined with gappy hedges and intermittent trees. 35 Continue past an animal pen and down and up through a shallow dip. 36 At a gate, turn right not the signposted Permissive Restricted Byway to Church Farm.
37 At a junction with another byway, continue straight ahead until you reach the road. 38 Turn left and walk back into Longbridge Deverill, passing Homefields (right) and Church Farm (left).

What to Bring?

Wear comfortable shoes and weather-appropriate layers. A light waterproof jacket is handy if rain is expected.

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


Brixton Deverill & Cold Kitchen Hill

A hearty downland walk with wide views over the Wiltshire countryside.

Allow 4–5 hours. Significant climbing, and some paths may be muddy after rain.

Follow steps 1–18 of the Brixton Deverill walk.



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Follow steps 1-18 of the Brixton **Deverill walk.**19 By another thatched house (Riversdale Cottage) turn left. An "important and well-preserved" Roman villa with a high-quality mosaic was discovered in a paddock to your left during cable-laying in 2015. 20 Walk between two houses and past the buildings of Woodcombe Farm, ignoring a bridleway off to the right. 21 Beyond the farm, follow the chalky track as it climbs past a left-hand bend and through a gate. 22 At the top of the hill, turn left onto a signposted bridleway which follows a farm track along a fenceline to an isolated building. 23 From here, follow the bridleway up the slope, past an uncultivated bank (the remains of a Neolithic long barrow) to the trig point at the top of Cold Kitchen Hill. 24 Bear right to a fire beacon. 25 Turn right along the track, now following the Mid-Wilts Way. 26 Pass the head of a deep downland combe (Bushcombe Bottom) on your right and resume climbing Whitecliff Down. 27 When you reach a fingerpost at a junction of bridleways by the indistinct remains of a bowl barrow, bear right across the field (following the direction indicated as LDEV23 to Horningsham 1¼), passing above the head of another deep valley (Woodcombe Bottom) on the right. 28 At the end of the field you meet a track, then turn left through a waymarked gate into a wood, still on the Mid-Wilts Way. 29 Follow the path through the trees for a while, then descend through scrubby land with farmland to your left. 30 The path develops into a sunken way and then exits the trees at the bottom of the wood by a fingerpost. 31 Walk down to a hand-gate into the field and turn right past a memorial stone. 32 Drop down to a further gate and follow the track along the bottom of the wood for a mile. 33 Continue beyond the end of the woodland for a short distance, then on meeting a crossing track turn left, following the brown 'Restricted Byway' waymark.

34 Turn right at the bottom and follow the track between overgrown hedges and then past some farm ponds. 35 Beyond the entrance to Rye Hill Farm, the byway continues ahead along a narrower path, stony and uneven in places. 36 Continue along the byway as it bends left and becomes a hedged green lane. 37 Beyond a crossing bridleway, continue ahead, again with overgrown hedges to either side. 38 After a memorial bench on the right, the track climbs a low hill to a double gateway. 39 Between the two gates, leave the track for a public footpath that heads down the left-hand side of the field on your left. 40 Climb a stile into the road. 41 Turn left and follow the road past the watercress beds on the right back into Longbridge Deverill village. 42 Beyond Mill Close, go through a gate on your left and cross the village green to a bridge over the stream back to the George Inn car park.

What to Bring?

Wear comfortable shoes and weather-appropriate layers. A light waterproof jacket is handy if rain is expected.

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
